PASTOR!

Pastor Pete's Article

When I was a retreat host at Luther Park Bible Camp in Danbury, WI, I got to wear many hats. I was a janitor, worship leader, front desk concierge, dishwasher, and many others. One of my favorites was that I got to be a go-fer for Vic, the maintenance guy. I got to be Vic's assistant and lend a helping hand where I could. I learned how to finish drywall, put up tongue and groove paneling, install windows and many other things. Throughout the year, we had many volunteers that would come to camp and help with projects. It was great to have the extra hands, but sometimes people would try projects that they had no idea how to complete. Sometimes, it was done horribly and so Vic would have to go back and fix it and redo it. And he would be frustrated and upset about wasting time and money. He told me, "I don't mind if you don't know how to do something, just ask for help. You can't blame someone for not knowing what they don't know."

That has stuck with me, "You don't know what you don't know." Meaning that you cannot recognize what you do not know. I hope that I'm not too into the weeds with double negatives. Let me put it to you this way, if you had never heard of Jesus Christ, how would you know what he has done for you? Does this mean that Christ has not resurrected? The resurrection still happened, even if someone did not know about it. If good things can happen without us knowing them, so can bad things. And we may not even realize that they are bad things. In fact, we can do bad things without even realizing it. Or it may not be bad things, it might be stuff that we are not doing. We cannot know what we do not know.

Same is true in the church. Sometimes, we are not even aware if we have weaknesses or shortcomings. It might be plain as day to other people, but we are unable to see. We need other people to open our eyes. And so we need your help. For the past two months, we have been asking you to fill out a survey that focuses on our strengths. What are we good at? What do we do well?

Now it is time for the other side of that coin. What are our weaknesses? What are our shortcomings? What areas do we need work in our church? For September, we are asking you to fill out the weakness portion of our SWOT analysis. Sometimes, we do not see our own weakness and need someone to point it out to us so we can work on it. And here is the beauty of a weakness, God takes that weakness and turns it into a gift! In my own life, my drinking was a weakness and I once heard an AA speaker talk about someone that they once heard speak. That person said, "If I could take away your drinking without a struggle, I wouldn't." Because that struggle, that challenge, that weakness will eventually make us stronger. Going through recovery was one of the greatest gifts that I could have ever received!

But first we need to acknowledge and see our weaknesses, so please help us by filling out the form attached to this newsletter. Or go online to our website and follow the links to fill it out. Or head to the easel in the back of the sanctuary and start filling out Post-It notes and stick them to the board so that we can see our weaknesses. Maya Angelou has a great quote: "Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better." We have been doing the best that we can, but we need to learn and grow so that we can do better. Please help us do and be better. Thank you and God Bless!
