Greetings Church!

Happy Advent! On November 29, 2020 we entered the four weeks of Advent- a time when we wait for the coming of our Lord. As I talked about in a recent sermon, waiting is hard. Our society doesn't like to wait. I'm reminded of this each year when, even though Christmas music starts playing on the radio in early November, I tend to wait to listen to it until Christmas Eve with hopes to keep listening through the 12 days of Christmas. Of course, I'm always disappointed because the music is pulled from the radio by midnight on the 25th of December. The church calendar may say Christmas starts on Dec. 25, but society can't wait that long, so by Dec. 26, after weeks of Christmas music and decorations, our secular culture is ready for it to be over.

The verse from Isaiah 40:31 says those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength and mount up with wings like eagles... In this time of CoVID, when so many of us are feeling so weary, having our strength restored sounds exactly like what we all need. It has been a HARD year in so many ways-we need our Lord's strength now more than ever.

Speaking of waiting, aside from a few of our parking lot worship services, we've all been fasting from Holy Communion since March on the guidance of the Presiding Bishop of the ELCA. But with this fast lasting much longer than we all initially expected, a growing number of clergy including myself, feel we must rethink the theological reasons to not do communion "virtually." So, in this newsletter, you will find a home liturgy for Holy Communion. You can use this on your own but more ideally if you are able to watch our online services, have some bread (or plain crackers in a pinch) and wine or juice ready on Sunday morning, and take communion at the point in the service where we all share the meal together, beginning on Dec. 6. Additionally, sometime in the coming weeks, I will also offer pre-packaged wine/juice cups and wafers for pick up from church to those who are interested and doorstep delivery to our shut-ins. I'm also considering to a drive-up communion as well- stay tuned.

May you all find some rest and strength in this Advent season as we **PREPARE** for Jesus to come again. Then, later this month as we, like Mary and Joseph ~2000 years ago, celebrate the birth of Christ at Christmas, may you feel the **JOY** that we have because of the One who entered the world to bring light into our darkness and who continues to be our Light, even now. That's why we have **HOPE** this Christmas, even though we will worship from home. God bless you all and give you **PEACE!**

Christmas Eve Worship Details:

CHOOSE THE BEST SERVICE FOR YOU!

The 2 pm service will broadcast live from church on Zoom. The link to access Zoom will be available by email, Facebook, and our church website. Worshipping on Zoom will allow us to SEE our fellow worshippers (who opt to be on camera), including while singing Silent Night together. Have a candle or flashlight ready! This candlelight service will include an interactive children's message, carols, special music, and the story of Christ's birth.

The 4 pm service will broadcast live from church on our ELC Facebook Page (If you don't have Facebook, you can link to the service through our website: www.englishlutheranchurch.org) The service will be a traditional candlelight Christmas Eve service with lots of carols, special music and the story of Christ's birth.

The 9 pm service will be a candlelight service that will "premiere" on Facebook, just as our normal Sunday services do. Being pre-recorded will allow for more special music and less chances for technical difficulties. This service will be the most like a "normal" Christmas Eve service, aside from not being in-person, and will include carols and the story of Christ's birth.

Christmas 2020

Dear Church Family,

As we approach Advent and Christmas we wanted to provide an update on English Lutheran's plans for the holiday season. Our Covid-19 Task Force has been meeting weekly to discuss when and how we can gather as a congregation, drawing on information from *Pierce County Public Health*, our Bishop, the *Wisconsin Council of Churches* and a range of other resources. After carefully considering the current Covid-19 situation in Pierce County, recommendations from our Bishop and other sources, our Covid-19 Task Force and the Church Council have decided it will not be possible to gather safely in-person for Advent or Christmas Services. We completely understand that gathering as a congregation for the holiday season is a treasured tradition and is important to all of us, but we need to do everything we can to keep our congregation and community safe. In the meantime, the Worship and Music Committee and our staff are hard at work coming up with alternative Advent and Christmas events to help bring us together in new ways this holiday season. Stay tuned for updates on these events, many of which are included in this newsletter. We continue to pray that we all can get this pandemic under control so we can once again gather together for in-person worship and ministry.

Christmas Luminaria Shine Christ's Light and Pray

December 21 and 24 (Dec. 21 is the Winter Solstice – the longest night)

This Christmas, the Youth of English Lutheran are building a display of Light dedicated to all our English Lutheran families to remind us all that God's love can shine even on the darkest of days.



A bag luminaire will be created for each family at ELC. A tea light will be placed in each bag and a prayer will be said for the family. All the bags will be lined up on the retaining wall for the whole town to see.

During past Christmas Eve services at English Lutheran we have a tradition of passing the Christ Light. We are all encircled in the darkened sanctuary and the Christ Light is passed around to each individual candle hand in our hands. We see the bright light of the Christ candle grow as it is passed from one candle to another until all are lit. The glow of the candles illumines the darkness. We sing Silent Night and our voices are lifting up the light so that the light becomes even brighter. As we leave the church, we take the light of Christ out into the darkness of the Christmas night. We will continue this tradition but instead of lighting our candles inside the church building, we will light a luminaire outside our walls for all to see.

The light of Christ within us is not to be hidden, but to be shared with all who cross our path. You may feel that you are "just one person" but together we grow the light to illuminate our world around us. Your light makes a difference!

Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl.


Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house.



~ The large difference in year to date expenses and income is due, in large part, to moving \$28,000 from our General checking account to a Thrivent investment account. With that transfer of money excluded from expenses, we've actually spent \$8,180.01 more than income year to date.

~ English Lutheran Church received a potentially forgivable loan through the Paycheck Protection Plan through the Small Business Administration. We have used \$28,200 for our payroll and utility expenses.

2020 Charitable Giving

Most taxpayers take advantage of the standard deduction when they are filing their Federal Income Tax Returns. The CARES Act provides an additional, "above-the-line" charitable deduction on top of the standard deduction for these taxpayers.

Taxpayers who do not itemize their deductions can take a one-time deduction of up to \$300 for charitable giving. The deduction applies ONLY for gifts of cash made in the calendar year 2020.

If you are not itemizing on your 2020 taxes, you

can claim this new deduction.

BISHOP'S CHRISTMAS LETTER



The CRISIS of CHRISTMAS¹

Dear Members and Friends of the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin,

Christmas 2020 will occur while we are living through of a series of crises. Here's the list: the pandemic, economic losses, protests against racial injustices, an ongoing climate crisis, and a divided country following a contentious presidential election. I'm not going to lie, it's been stressful for me, and I imagine it has been for you, too. As Christians, we have been moving through these crisis-

filled days with the expectation that God is present and God's promises are true. We move forward with hope.

The two Chinese characters for the word "**crisis**," 危机, have often been translated as "danger" and "opportunity." Others say that a better translation is "danger" and "change point." What dangers do you see as your congregation moves toward celebrating the Birth of our Savior – Christmas - in a totally new way? What "opportunities" or "change points" do you see that could propel your church forward in a positive way into God's future?

Mary experienced a theological crisis when the angel Gabriel revealed to her God's plan to enter this world by the baby in her womb. Mary's body was the center of a theological crisis² - much like the theological crisis caused by a virus that has invaded the bodies of our loved ones, and the theological crisis of abused and broken black and brown bodies, and the theological crisis experienced in the misuse of this planet on which all bodies live. Where is God in the crisis? What does this mean?

In a crisis, God comes to us. John 1:1,14 *In the beginning was the Word... and the Word was God...And the Word became flesh and lived among us.* Jesus is God, divine *and* human. God took up residence and moved into our neighborhood. God goes where God's people go and is who the people are.³ This is the theological promise of John's gospel. God is present with us in our times of crisis and suffering. This is the foundation of Luther's theology of the cross.

God is revealed through the crisis of Mary's pregnancy and Jesus' untimely birth in a Bethlehem barn. God is revealed in the crucifixion; through the body of Jesus, hanging on a cross. God is revealed through the risen body of Jesus on Easter Morning.

No matter how different Christmas is for you this year, no matter what crisis arises, God is there, present as promised, in the WORD made flesh. May the story of Jesus' birth bring you much needed joy and hope this holiday season and may the presence of God comfort you in the new year.

CREATING AN ALTAR TABLE AT HOME

- + Add liturgical color to your space
 - Advent=Blue; Christmas/Baptism of our Lord=White; Epiphany=Green
- + Small bowl with water This is a reminder of our baptism.
- + Candle to light as you worship This is a reminder of the light of Christ.
- + Small cross to the space
- + Prepare your table for a meal You could include special dishes or decorations; include some wine or grape juice and bread or in a pinch plain crackers (homemade, easy bread recipe found at the end of this document prepare in advance)
- + If you are a household of two or more invite each person to share in some aspect of this liturgy, and be sure to include all who are able to share in this meal; together, you are connected to the whole body of Christ.
- + **If you are a household of one** Christ promises to come to us through the word and sacrament, and you are connected to the whole body of Christ when you speak these words and share in this meal.

A NOTE ABOUT WORSHIP + HOLY COMMUNION

The church is anywhere people gather in Jesus' name. When we cannot meet in a church building, God continues to be present in the creative and intentional ways we gather for worship. Therefore, when you gather in Jesus' name, your home is church, too.

We've fasted from Communion for most of the pandemic, not knowing how long our fast would be! This liturgy provides a way to receive communion until we can safely do pastoral visits and gather again in church. The bread and wine are mysteriously the real presence of Jesus Christ, and we trust that Jesus is really with us in this meal. While we can't gather for this meal it is acceptable to either:

- + 1.) Continue fasting from Holy Communion OR
- + 2.) Use the liturgy in this worship service to celebrate Holy Communion in your home as part of our online worship if possible, or on its own if not.

LITURGY

- **+ SCRIPTURE +** (Read the scripture assigned for the day)
- + **REFLECTION ON GOD'S WORD** + (Reflect on God's Word, or watch your pastor's video sermon)

+ CONFESSION & FORGIVENESS +

When the church gathers for Holy Communion with all the saints from every time and place, we hear again the story of God's power and the love shown to us through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.

We share this word of life, and this bread and cup of blessing, that we may receive these same gifts and be strengthened by the whole Christian community.

Hear us, O God, and help us as we confess our sins.

God of mercy, we have failed and become broken in more than one way; we are quick and careless with our words, instead of speaking with truth and kindness; we have been irresponsible with your creation, neglectful of our neighbors, and selfish with what you have provided. We dwell in fear of the unknown and anxiety about the future, instead of trusting your faithfulness and love for us. Please forgive us, fill us with your abundant mercy, and guide us toward a life of healing and wholeness.

God loves us unconditionally, at all time and in all places. By grace we have been saved. In the name of Jesus Christ, our sins are forgiven. **AMEN**

+ WORDS OF INSTITUTION +

(Holding the bread) In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, given for you Do this for the remembrance of me."

(Holding the cup) Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this in remembrance of me."

Lord, remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray:

Our Father, who art heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth, as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread;
and forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those

+ SHARING THE MEAL +

forever and forever. AMEN

- + When giving the bread say, "The body of Christ, given for you."
- + When giving the wine/grape juice say, "The blood of Christ, shed for you."

+ PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION +

In the mystery of Christ's resurrection, you shine light into the darkness, provide water that brings new life, and give bread that nourishes your people and frees us from our fear. Help us be witnesses of the resurrection and empower us to show your glory to all the world, through Jesus Christ, our risen Lord. **AMEN**

+ BLESSING EACH OTHER +

Using your thumb make the sign of the cross on one another's foreheads or the back of their hand saying, **"You are a beloved child of God."**Take turns until each household member has been blessed.

+ CLOSING WORDS +

Called to be the body of Christ, let us abide with one another in peace.

Thanks be to God.

Communion Bread Recipe


From Luther Seminary to your table

Sift dry ingredients together **three times**: (important!)

2 c whole wheat flour 1 c white flour 1 & 1/4 tsp baking powder 1 & 1/4 tsp salt

Stir in 4 tsp oil. Set aside.


Mix wet ingredients together until dissolved:



Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and mix well. Dough should be slightly sticky. Do not knead.

Divide into four balls and flatten each into a 1/4 inch thick disk.

With a knife, score the top of each loaf into eight pie-shaped sections, so that the sections can be more easily broken off while serving. Alternatively, you could score a cross onto the loaf.



Lay the loaves on a baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and brush the tops of the loaves with oil. Bake an additional 5-8 minutes. Let cool.

Yield: four 8 oz. loaves. Each loaf serves 60-70 people, depending upon the size of the piece given. The loaves freeze well.
